Deeply affecting, multi-award-winning drama exploring emotional recovery from the impact of Nairobi's terrorist bombings of 1998.

A family is torn apart by the terrorist bombing of the US Embassy in Nairobi in 1998, in which over 250 people died and the aftershocks of which still tremble today. Years after the horrific event, a teenage girl is still searching for her mother, through radical art and less than legal adventures. Kahiu's emotionally powerful drama swept the board at last year's African Movie Academy Awards, we say rightly so!

Wanuri Kahiu is one of Kenya's most talented young filmmakers. Having trained in the US and worked on The Italian Job and Catch A Fire, Wanuri is now back in Kenya and working on several new projects. Look out for her highly-anticipated sci-fi short Pumzi at festivals later this year.

Dir Judy Kibinge, Kenya, 2008

Adapted from a graphic novel, this stylish drama tells of the chasm between rich and poor in contemporary Kenya. A young man tries to stay away from the enticements of crime as he longs to buy his girlfriend the necklace that she covets. Nothing is as it seems as the story unfolds and its layers unravel.

Judy Kibinge was born in Nairobi in 1967 and is an artist, writer and filmmaker. Her main works are *Dangerous Affair* (2002), *Project Daddy* (2004), *Peace Wanted Alive* (2009) and *Coming Of Age* (2008).

FOR OUR LAND

Dir Wanuri Kahiu, Kenya, 2008

Kenyan environmental and social justice activist Wangari Maathai won the Nobel Peace Prize in 2004. Through her Green Belt movement she has planted 30 million trees in her motherland and protected endangered indigenous forests. A one-woman tour-de-force, Maathai captures camera and audience with her infectious fervour as she advocates pro-democracy and environmental restitution causes in this inspiring documentary.

Caring for Durban's abused children and fighting for their rights in equally fierce measures, the women behind Bobbi Bear are a force to be reckoned with. Strong, passionate and fearless, they show an unbounded capacity for love and empathy in the face of harrowing work and personal tragedies. *Rough Aunties* handles painfully raw subject matter with honesty and respect – a testament to the unerring wisdom and compassion of the 'Rough Aunties' of Bobbi Bear.

MY NEIGHBOR, MY KILLER

Dir. Anne Aghion, US/France 2009 ICA Cinema 1, Thur March 11, 8.30pm

"A much-needed examination of the challenging yet necessary process of justice and reconciliation in the aftermath of genocide", Newsweek.

Truth and Reconciliation, Rwandan style - a hugely insightful exploration of the complicated process of restoration in the aftermath of the 1994 genocide.

One of the rare documentary films to be accepted as Official Selection at Cannes, this in-depth study explores the Gacaca Tribunals in Rwanda, open-air hearings in which Rwandan Hutus charged with the 1994 genocide and having been released from prison, are judged by Tutsi survivors and citizen-judges. Aghion charts the complicated emotional impacts as well as the practical consequences of this groundbreaking legal experiment in reconciliation and justice.

Documentarian **Anne Aghion** spent almost ten years filming **My Neighbor** in a tiny hamlet in Rwanda.
