Argentinians strike back as capitalism kills

In Argentina thousands strike and take to the streets in protest after two are killed in cold blood.

On Wednesday 26th June during demonstrations at Pueyrredon Bridge in Buenos Aires, two young men Maximiliano Costeki and Dario Santillan, were shot in cold blood in an execution-style killing with shots to the head.

Both were part of the piquetero organisations (unemployed workers' movements), and had stopped to assist an injured person when the shootings happened. Not only were these two brave piqueteros killed but more than 160 were



injured (many with bullet wounds) and hundreds were arrested. On the day of action there were many road blocks (piquetes) up and down the country, but the centre of the action was at the access roads to Buenos Aires, here police repression was particularly brutal. Tear gas was also used against the anti-government protesters in the worst riots since the government was toppled in December.

The following day thousands of angry and shocked people took to the streets in a mass mobilisation at the Plaza de Mayo, to protest over the deaths, calling on President Eduardo Duhalde to resign. Meanwhile teachers and state workers also went on strike, in protest against government repression and Argentina,s worsening economic crisis brought on by the austerity measures which is being insisted on by the IMF. The governor of the state of Buenos Aires ordered the arrests of two policemen and suspended over 100 others after a newspaper published photographs, showing the extreme levels of violence, repression and state direction used by the police.

A statement from IMC Argentina said" We just received notice that one of the murdered piqueteros is Daro Santillan, Continued on Page 2

The only party worth fighting for... UK free-party revival

The helicopters hover overhead and the countryside is once again closed off with police roadblocks - it can only mean one thing, it's time to party...

The beginning of June saw the 10 year anniversary of the legendar y Castlemorten Common free festival, where tens of thousands of people came together to party, and which was largely credited with prompting the draconian Criminal Justice Act (CJA), targeting free raves, political protesters and travellers. The anniversary coincided with the Jubilee weekend, so while the royal family celebrated their outdated institution, the state used its power to try and stop the people partying in their own DIY style. But despite a large police operation which saw helicopters, horses, dogs, riot police and roadblocks over a 5 mile radius to stop the anniversary

celebration, the party went ahead at Steart Beach, just south of Bristol, where thousands of people danced the weekend away with around 30 sound systems (see www.dubb-it-up.com). Several other large parties also went ahead up and down the country mostly unhindered by police who had concentrated on the bristol party. Many Anti-Jubilee protesters were not so lucky however with over 40 being 'preventatively arrested' in a clear move by the state to stifle dissent.

This year's Summer Solstice at
Stonehenge (June 21st) saw around
23,000 people gathering in the third year
of 'controlled open access' to the stones,
in the past the scene for bitter and bloody
confrontation with the police. The event
passed off pretty smoothly with only
around 11 arrests, despite this police
surveillance units were out once again

videoing and photographing as many people as possible. Tension was high after reports of the police obstructing attempts to secure a 'legal' site for a post solstice gathering, made even more significant by the almost impregnable new fence and heightened security at the increasingly commercial Glastonbury Festival. In the end several attempts to find a free festival site were scuppered by the police, although several smaller gatherings went ahead. Avebury, the site of another large stone circle was almost completely sealed off by police road blocks after many people gathered there after Stonehenge, before heading to several other free parties, which went ahead in other counties. A few days later and the Glastonbury Festival seemed almost empty at times as the new security measures kept the majority of

gatecrashers outside. An alternative free festival did go ahead with several thousand people partying at a disused military airbase.

More recently as 200,000 people attended a free legal (and commercial) beach party in Brighton put on by DJ Fatboy Slim - leaving behind a devastating amount of rubbish and broken glass, another beach party went off in London. The 'Reclaim The Beach' party attracted around four hundred people to the sandbank beach revealed by the river Thames low tide. In a perfect example of DIY culture, people spent the night on the beach with music and projections, all rubbish was collected, sorted for recycling, and taken off site. Police arrived just as the party was ending, took a quick look around, talked to folks removing the rubbish, and quickly left.

21 years old, a friend from the La F Neighborhood. Daro, part of the MTD (Unemployed Worker.s Movement) in the area, was a bricklayer who worked every day in a factory making bricks for a new community hall. He lived on land taken a few months ago, on a vacant farm. All of us participating in Indymedia had the fortune of sharing with him several pickets, assemblies and unforgettable conversations. In these moments we don't have words to express our pain and our anger. His murderers will pay for having stolen from us this beautiful friend."

IMC Argentina condemn the media coverage, which sang to the tune of those in power. "The crisis has caused two new deaths" was the title in the local media as if trying to make us believe that the crisis shoots lead bullets, without resorting to the services of the police. Adding to an intimidation campaign, the same daily said that today "They will try to march to the Plaza de Mayo, as if this were an exploit, rather than a right." Reports say that the Argentinian government had led a vicious media campaign to demonise the piqueteros for repression because they had been at the forefront of the struggle against the mismanagement of the Argentinian economy and they had became a pole of reference for thousands of workers and the youth. Meanwhile, protests against neoliberal economic policies are erupting in other Latin American countries. Thousands of people took the streets of Paraguay in early June, to protest the process of privatisation of state companies. On June 4th a large mobalisation by the peasants ended with the murder of Calixto Cabral by a police officer. The Central Command of Workers (Central Nacional de Trabajadores CNT) met on June 5 and summoned the workers from all over the country to go on a general strike without an expected end date in response to the privatisation process and the police brutality. However, the announcement of a general strike caused the government to suspend the auction of the state telephone company Antelco.

Successful Mobilisation Against he governments 'Snooping Charter'

On June 18th the UK home secretary David Blunkett abandoned plans to extend the electronic snooping powers given to the police (under the RIP Act) to a huge range of local authorities and public bodies. In what must have been the shortest privacy campaign ever around 1600 people sent faxes to their MPs through the FaxYourMP website.

The anti-RIP website stand.org.uk which itself only relaunched a couple of weeks ago, led the fax campaign and now says "there are dozens of other bits of legislation hanging about with vast technological idiocies contained within - the RIP Act draft Code of Practices; the EU's Copyright Directive and Data Retention orders; laws against reverse-engineering; software patents and who knows what"

12,000 Lobby Parliament For Fair Trade

The Pink Castle protest stops GM trial

After seven weeks, a GM crop squat in Dorset is over. Protesters had occupied the field with a 20ft tall pink castle since April 25th. The castle residents hoped to obstruct the farmer and prevent further GM contamination.

On the 16th May, three weeks into the occupation, farmer Charles Foot with seven tractors and a massive police presence, entered the field and succeeded in planting the Aventis GM maize, resulting in four arrests.

As only two thirds of the field was planted, the pink castle remained to defend the rest. By early June, the entire crop of GM maize had been pulled up by visitors to the pink castle. The GM maize crop has now been completely destroyed and the trial written off. Protesters celebrated over the weekend then packed up and left the site.

How to publish your own reports on the Indymedia UK Website:



Offline is a monthly publication bringing the highlights of the IndyMedia website news back onto the streets. IndyMedia is a global network of news websites that encourage the public to report their own stories to the world uncensored. Aiming to providing background stories the corporate media continuously ignores. We would encourage you to photocopy this and spread it far and wide. For more info and latest copies download a PDF from the site or send an SAE to:

Step One: All you need do to start is hit the 'PUBLISH' link on the front page of the site (www.indymedia.org.uk).

Step Two: Follow the instructions on the Publish page (they're easy to follow) - you have to enter some information about the report you are uploading - a Title for your report and your name, which can be anything you like. There are also other spaces on the form for your email and telephone number etc, but you don't have to fill them in.

Step Three: You then just need to select what it is you want to publish on the site. Text: If you are submitting a text report then simply type straight into the part of the form called 'Text Stories - the article', and then hit the 'Publish' button at the bottom of the form - That's it! Your report will now be added to the website.

Photographs: If you are submitting a photograph you need to select the picture from your hard drive using the 'Browse' button in the 'Multimedia Stories' box, then select from the drop down menu what type of picture it is (either jpeg/jpg image or gif), and then hit the 'Publish' button at the bottom of the form -That's it! Your picture will now be added to the wehsite

Audio / Video: If you are submitting either an audio or video file select it from your hard drive using the 'Browse' button in the 'Multimedia Stories' box, then select from the drop down menu what type of file it is (either mp3 or realaudio for audio files, or realvideo for video), hit the 'Publish' button at the bottom of the form - That's it! your sound or video clip will now be added to the website.

Starved of justice - we hunger for rights to life

Activists Fast in Bhopal Over Union Carbide Spill and over Narmada Dams:

In late June, a protest in Bhopal, the capital of the central Indian state of Madhya Pradesh, was organised by the National Campaign for Justice in Bhopal. It began with a sit-in on June 26 by some 200 activists, while an indefinite hunger strike started on June 29. This strike was initiated by survivors of the Union Carbide chemical spill in Bhopal, and passed its tenth day on July 8 with no assurance coming from the Indian government on the protesters' demands. On July 10, rallies for Bhopal survivors are planned in New Dehli, Mumbai, and elsewhere.

The hunger strikers include survivors such as Satinath Sarangi, a founder member of the Bhopal Group for Information and Action. They are protesting new developments, including proposed reductions in charges against former Union Carbide CEO Warren Anderson, and the government's decision to distribute compensation funds to residents of 20 municipal wards in Bhopal unaffected by the disaster.



Over a month earlier on May 20, activists from the Save the Narmada Movement against Big Dams began a fast in Bhopal. This fast ended after thirty days, and focused on the eviction of more than 1000 families displaced by the Maan Dam on the Narmada River. Non-violent resistance against large dams on the river continues as flooding increases in the ongoing monsoon. 
Woomera hunger strikers at the Strand.

Since the 8th of July four hunger strikers have positioned themselves in front of the Australian High Commission at Australia House at the Strand (London). They are staged a three-day protest in support of the refugees locked up in the notorious Australian Woomera Detention Centre, who have been on hunger strike themselves for the past sixteen days.

The police threatened to remove the hunger strikers, claiming their presence constitutes an 'intrusion to the dignity of the building'. The protesters action theme now is: "What government puts the dignity of a building over the dignity of a person?". Other support actions for Woomera took place in New Castle , Kyogle (New South Wales), Mexico, Israel, India and the United States. Hunger striking farmers of Oaxaca, Mexico, request justice and freedom

Following the massacre of 26 peasants on May 31 in the municipality of San Pedro, the State Police of Oaxaca arrested 17 peasants from Las Huertas. The police did not restrain from violence, damaging and looting the homes. The operation caused great upheaval and the local community is protesting with vigils in front of the governor's palace in the centre of the city of Oaxaca. The oaxaqueños community is demanding justice: "We came to the Governor's Palace to demand an accurate investigation by the government into the murders instead of arresting innocent people," said one of the demonstrators. Spain general strike

As part of the mobilisation against the EU summit of 20-21 June in Seville, Trade unions across Spain called for a General Strike on Thursday 20th in protest at the Popular Party government's reform of unemployment and workers' rights laws. The strike was widely taken up all over the Spanish State with reports of up to 85% stoppages in some areas, affecting the manufacturing, transport, private and public sectors.

No justice in legal aftermath: Gothenburg/Sweden

The legal aftermath of the demonstrations against the EU summit and Bush visit to Gothenburg/Sweden last summer display serious evidence of violation of human rights and makes new precedents in Swedish legal history. According to Swedish legal practice, the sentences are ten-fold longer and harsher then it's precedents, clearly showing it is a matter of political trials and political prisoners:

- 102 trials, 52 sentences of civilian citizens, 450 people are identified as suspect and awaiting investigation.
- Excessive long incarcerations of the accused people with up to 3 months in isolation cells.
- Sentences of up to 2 and 4 years (many of the

prosecuted are minors with no criminal records)

- The High Court has, to this date, not tried appeal any of the cases pertaining to the occurrences in Gothenburg.
- No enquiries into the police conduct (live ammunition shootings into the demonstrations leaving a person fighting for his life neither to the siege of the schools Schillerska or Hvitfeldska and the polices' manipulation of video evidence, publicly shown to be false.

An international day of action in support for the Gothenburg prisoners was called on Wednesday 5th of June, and events took place around Europe.

Dutch Indymedia loses court case from German Railways

June 20 a Dutch court ruled that Indymedia.NL has to remove links to mirror-sites of German magazine Radikal, in a lawsuit initiated by German Railway Company Deutsche Bahn. Deutsche Bahn demanded that Indymedia delete an archive page with links to sites that link through to two notorious articles on blocking nuclear transports, originally published in German magazine Radikal.

Colombia Again Most Dangerous Nation for Union Members

According to an annual survey, Colombia was the most dangerous nation for union members again last year, with 201 killings or disappearances reported. This is 90% of the reported worldwide total. Public sector union

members in Colombia were targeted the most, accounting for about 65 percent of those killed or missing. The ICFTU (International Confederation of Free Trade Unions) attributed that to their opposition to privatisation of state-owned industries.

This is part of the dark side of corporate globalisation, which attempts to paint a humanitarian face on its agenda. However, if it were truly a better way, it would not need to intimidate, torture, and kill union workers around the world to achieve its aims.

The Colombian union SINALTRAINAL, the 'National Union of the Food Workers Industry' has issued a call denouncing kidnapping attempts, while assasinations continue in Barrancabermeja and Tame.



KANANASKIS June 26-27 2002 - G8 SUMMIT - protests mobilise across-Canada against G8 and all they stand for

On June 26th and 27th two days of action took place in Ottawa as the leaders of the G8 countries met in the secluded mountains of Kananaskis, Alberta. Protesters took the streets of different Canadian cities to oppose the destructive agenda perpetuated by the G8.

The leaders of the G8 nations represent a



small proportion of the world's population, but control the majority of the world's economic resources. This is a form of neo-liberal imposition veiled as development, which benefits the rich and powerful elites, leaving the rest behind. The G8's support of FTAA, the IMF/World Bank, and the WTO, results in the privatisation and corporatisation of the planet, with Africa being one of the continents most affected through the G8's sponsored NEPAD. The self-serving "war on terrorism", orchestrated by the leaders of the G8, continues to militarise and brutalise countries and communities in every continent, while cynically appealing for civilisation and freedom.

In Ottawa, Calgary and Alberta thousands of protesters loudly declared their opposition to the G8, and showed their solidarity with the people criminalised and marginalised by its policies. The days of action, titled Take the Capital, involved various forms of demonstration, popular education, a freedom festival, civil disobedience, squatting, direct action, caravans, a Critical Mass and a 1000 flags of Resistance demo under the banner "No One is Illegal!".

On the 23rd in Calgary, the closest city to the summit, five thousand people marched through the streets. On the 26th and 27th thousands again took the streets of Ottawa despite heavy

police and army intimidation and culminated with soccer games taking place in two of the city's busiest intersections.. The government spent more that \$300,000,000 security costs to protect the world's leaders from dissent,

Protests against the World Bank academic conference, Oslo

ABCDE IN OSLO Jun 20 2002: Monday 24th was the start of the World Bank academic conference (ABCDE) in Oslo, Norway. At the same time a counterconference called 'South meets North' took place in the city. During the "Open Forum" of the counter-conference, former Zambian president Kenneth Kaunda and Philippino organiser Lidy Nacpil were amongst the speakers. Their criticism aimed at the very existence of the Bank, as well as its policies was strong and factual, specially taking into account that they represented two countries that are directly affected by the WB's programs. A counter-festival was also held in a relaxed atmosphere with stands, music and workshops. The Norwegian Adbusters network launched their 'VB' spoof newspaper, plagiarising the country's largest tabloid ("VG") with critical articles on the World Bank.

Along side the counter-conference, the Oslo2002 network of organisations and communities demonstrated against the World Bank in a colourful, carnival protest with a pink bloc and samba band, fireworks, juggling, banners, balloons, slogans, dance and music was attended by over 10, 000 people.

The protests opened on Sunday evening with a party and concert at the

Oslo YaBasta! collective centre. After Mondays main demo, there was a very successful, independent Reclaim The Streets party that ended with the squatting of two disused houses in central Oslo. "Our message here is that people need houses and houses need people", said one of the squatters. The day before the party a debate between Attac & RTS emerged. One of the organisers Attac tried to prevent its members from attending the RTS party, citing their political stance! This was met with strong criticism from members of the 2001 parents network, who's children were among those arrested for protesting against the EU in

Gothenburg in June 2001.

The diversity and creativity of the protest encouraged many curious citizens to join the protesters. The police were almost invisible during the entire, nonviolent demo, although police had used scare-mongering tactics in the media to frighten off potential protesters and repression and surveillance had increased in Norway during the days prior to the WB meeting. Immigration officials checked people's identities when arriving at Oslo airport, and those registered in the Schengen Information System were arrested and some immediately deported. Rome Food Summit - Indigestible and Stomach - churning

Whilst over 800 million people starve in poverty, suffer endemic hunger in structural adjustment programs and demise as their land is stolen in the name of development, The World Food Summit in Rome, organised by the UN Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO), was dominated by the corporate pursuit of Genetically modified organisms (GMOs).

As the summit closed on Thursday 11th july, and officials and activists began leaving, they saw little evidence of renewed political will to deal with controversial issues such as the agricultural subsidies that developing-country leaders here

said kept them poor and their people hungry, and reflected the double standards of industrialised countries who otherwise call for free trade.

An international code of conduct on food rights was attempted, a declaration that everyone had the right to safe food, but this was watered down amid concerns by countries like the United States about the legal implications of such language such as 'the right to food', ie, the US feared it would leave them open to legal claims by famine-stricken countries.

Non-governmental organisations (NGOs) holding parallel meetings here decried as a

disgrace the triumph of the biotechnology industry in pushing its agenda at the conference. "We will fight to stop genetic engineering and the patenting of life and demand an immediate ban of terminator and similar genetic use restriction technologies," said Sarojeni Rengam of the Malaysia-based Pesticide Action Network (PAN).

Brazilian activist Flavio Luz Schieck Valente added: "The agreement to increase research on biotechnology shows the pressure the United States put on the summit. In this way, the summit serves the industry, not the people."
