Manchester- New Labour's Favourite City

In fact, since the 1996 IRA bombing the city has been at the forefront of this government's urban agenda, earning high praise from the party hierarchy and business groups'. Manchester No Borders alongside many others participated in the annual 'Mayday march', this year Monday 5 May. "Health Care for All" was one of the central demands of the march, organised by the Trades Union Council and campaigners for asylum rights. Over 200 people attended the march and speaker event in Manchesters Peace Gardens.

A recent decision by Judge Mitting

ruled that all refused asylum seekers must be considered 'ordinarily resident' in the UK, therefore charging them for NHS care is unlawful. But, despite this ruling there are reports that refugees still face refusal or charges for health care. The ruling has been appealed by the government and will go to the House of Lords.

Police attack free party goers - Again

On a warm summer's evening it is nice to see local residents of a guiet road mingling with each other and having a good time, which is exactly what was happening on Saturday 10th



on Lancross Rd in Fallowfield. Speakers were put out on the rooof of one house and it turned into a street party involving a couple of hundred people. Despite the event being entirely good-natured, on a trafficless street and in a student area, on a weekend, the police decided that it had to ended in the most violent manner possible. Shortly after 3am, without warning, riot police charged the crowd acompanied by dogs. Witnesses report seeing passive party-goers being gleefully beaten to a pulp by riot police and savaged by dogs. Police had removed their identification numbers for the occassion and this is nothing new, something very similar happened at Bellvue last year. People are trying to organise against GMP's brutality and will attempt to sue.

Anti-GM protest shuts down HQ of world's leading chemical company

The UK headquarters of BASF at Cheadle Hulme, near Manchester, were blockaded on the morning of the 6th May. Sum 30 protesters of 'Earth First!' carried out the action to highlight the company's role in pushing GM onto our plates.



BASF is planning to run the UK's only trial of GM crops this year, a trial of blight resistant potatoes.

"It is not the shortages, hunger or

answer to food The protesters arrived early in the morning at the flagship offices and blockaded the gate for several hours by sitting in front of it and climate change" locking on with bicycle d-locks and other

equipment. They successfully prevented any

staff from entering and demanded that the company pull out of GM immediately. A huge 30 x 10ft banner was hung reading "No To GM".

Mary Sunderland from Earth First! Said: "GM has no part to play in our future: it's a dangerous, unwanted and unproven technology geared towards maximising profits for multinational corporations such as BASF. It is not the answer to food shortages, hunger or climate change. The real solution is to change now to a sustainable farming system and to distribute resources fairly around the world."

Food Not Bombs is Back!



After a slight winter lull, FNB is back and going strong in Manchester. Keep an eye out for their delicious three-course meals given out on the street for free, yes, they want nothing in return! Read on for the recent history of this wonderful movement:

There are hundreds of autonomous FNB

chapters sharing free vegetarian food with hungry people and protesting against war and poverty around the world. Not a charity, they organize for peace and for 25+ years have worked to end hunger, support anti-globalization action, and action against restrictions to the movements of people, exploitation and the destruction of the earth.

A number of Food

The first group was formed in Cambridge, Massachusetts in 1980 by anti-nuclear activists. It is all-voluntary, with no formal leaders. Each group recovers food that would otherwise be thrown out and makes fresh hot meals, served in public spaces to anyone. The

A number of Food Not Bombs volunteers have been arrested on terrorism charges but there has never been a conviction.

San Francisco chapter has been arrested over 1,000 times in government efforts to silence their protest against the city's anti-

homeless policies. Amnesty International states it will adopt those FNB volunteers that are convicted as "Prisoners of Conscience" and will work for their unconditional release.

Although dedicated to nonviolence, FNB activists in the United States have been under investigation by the FBI Joint Terrorism Task Force, Pentagon and other intelligence agencies.

The network is often the first to provide food and supplies to the survivors of natural disasters and terrorist attacks. They groups carry the message 'We hope you will join us in taking direct action towards creating a world free from domination, coercion and violence. Food is a right, not a privilege'.

Squat Update

The weekend of April 12th kicked off a flurry of squat actions in Manchester, to correspond with an international weekend of action to defend autonomous spaces. On that date a squatted social centre was established in Hulme and used as a social and meeting space. However, the site has now been evicted and the residents have moved on to a residential squat elsewhere. The squat was evicted after the users lost a court case to the council who say they have plans for the building.
